# Schoenberg To Conduct S.D. Symphony Tomorrow

Even if you don't understand the Sphinx, you go to see it if you are nearby.

Tomorrow night in Ford Bowl you will have the opportunity of seeing and hearing Arnold Schoenberg, explorer in the realms of sound, as he conducts the San Diego Federal Symphony in a Bach, Brahms and Schoenberg program.

Schoenberg's "Verklaerte Nacht" which the famous composer will conduct tomorrow night, should be as easily understood as Brahms. This work, composed in Schoen-

berg's 25th year, was inspired by a Richard Dehmal poem, something very romantic about "the transfiguration of the world through the eyes of a benevolent lover who has forgiven his sweetheart for her sin," to quote a gifted program commentator.

The exact sin is not stated, but even if it was only scorching the beans, it was big of the man to forgive her. He must have felt pretty uplifted.

After the strings of the orchestra have played this quite understandable music of Schoenberg's youth, the composer will conduct the orchestra in his splendid arrangement of a Bach Prelude and Fugue in E flat and the Brahms Piano Quartet in A major, scored for full orchestra.—C. H.
